

Context

St Patrick's College is a Catholic day and boarding school for boys in Years 7 to 12 in the Edmund Rice tradition, founded in 1893 and conducted by Edmund Rice Education Australia (EREA).

Our College is named after St Patrick, the patron saint of Ireland, who brought Christianity to the Irish people. Born in England in the late 4th Century, he was later ordained a Bishop and arrived in Sloane, Ireland on 25 March 433. By the time of his death on 17 March 461, he had established many monasteries, churches, and schools.

St Patrick is said to have used the three leaves and stalk of the shamrock to explain the concept of the Holy Trinity, three persons in one God.

Patrick was a humble, pious, gentle man, whose love and total devotion to and trust in God should be a shining example to each of us.

Central to the mission of the College is an unequivocal commitment to fostering the dignity, self-esteem and integrity of all our students and providing them with a safe, supportive and enriching environment to develop spiritually, physically, intellectually, emotionally and socially. The College is committed to achieving excellence in all its forms.

The EREA Learning Statement

In addition to The Charter, EREA has recently launched its Learning Statement: 'Implementing Liberating Practice: to Co-create a Better World'. Liberating Practice involves explicitly co-creating the learning conditions, dispositions and relationships to enable deep listening, confidence, agency and freedom.

Achieving Liberating Practice involves the following six elements:

Liberating Pedagogies

in exploring meaning and purpose in life, the learner is free to grow in their understanding of themselves, and their relatedness with God, others, Earth and creation, through experiences grounded in wonder, awe, contemplation and action for justice and the common good.

Liberating Achievement

when excellence and improvement are viewed in a variety of ways and evidence of success is gathered, interpreted and celebrated holistically, the learner is free to pursue a strengths-based learning pathway informed by high expectations and personal ambitions.

where schools design and develop innovative learning environments, whether physical and/or virtual, the learner is free to access and engage in multiple pathways and contribute to a dynamic, connected educational community.

Liberating Potential

when learning experiences are informed by each person's story, strengths and passions, the learner is free to contribute to and participate in challenging, individualised learning plans that orient their goals towards personal growth.

Liberating Voice and Agency

when individual voice is deeply listened to, respected and included in decision-making processes, the learner is free to develop the confidence, resilience, optimism and agency to fully determine their learning aspirations.

Our curriculum is delivered alongside an inclusive and engaging co-curricular program, for a holistic educational experience in which students, as emerging global citizens, are encouraged to explore and discover their unique strengths and talents. In the coming years we will continue to adopt new technologies and learning methodologies, expanding and broadening pathways for student learning. - Expanding and reviewing pathways and curriculum offerings, to ensure a contemporary and rigorous boys' education, where every student's unique strength and talent is supported and celebrated.
- 4. Through the implementation of the explicit teaching of writing, enhancing literacy education at the whole school level.

- 5. Gathering and responding to student survey data, to understand learners' experiences and needs in the classroom. Through this, empowering students to become advocates for their own learning.
- Honouring our commitment to the Reconciliation Action Plan, by both ensuring the authentic integration of Indigenous perspectives in all aspects of our curriculum, and by actively supporting all Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students in achieving their learning goals.
- Continuing to foster a deep respect and aspiration for scholarship, which understands its place as a fitting response to God's gift of reason and intellect. Through this, we seek to become a centre of excellence in teaching and learning.



Pastoral Care and Wellbeing

We will continue to prioritise pastoral care and wellbeing, creating optimal learning environments for students to flourish and foster a culture of positive behaviour. Using a strengths-based approach, we aim to build on our inclusive culture, respectful relationships, and the development of self in every student.

Specific priorities in Pastoral Care and Wellbeing include:

- Fostering an environment in which all students and staff are accepted and feel safe, included, heard, valued, and respected.
- Effectively supporting Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students academically, emotionally and culturally through authentic engagement with the Reconciliation Action Plan.
- Ensuring all faculties of wellbeing within the College work together to ensure inclusive communities and equal access to programs for all students.
- Fostering a culture where boys are active participants in learning, community, pastoral care and wellbeing programs.
- Developing and embedding a holistic pastoral program, based on positive education approaches and the respectful relationships program, providing a modern and research-informed approach to the development of student wellbeing for boys and their formation.

- Prioritising the role of student voice in all aspects of the College, including culture, decision making, teaching and learning, child safety, leadership, ritual and celebration.
- Embracing contemporary research into student wellbeing, along with student wellbeing data, to reflect and guide professional conversations and future planning.

'The St Patrick Breastplate', (adapted from the Lorica of St Patrick) is St Patrick's poem of faith and trust in God.


I arise today
