

FROM THE HEADMASTER

Sorry Day 2008

In anticipation of the 2008 Sorry Day on February 13, I wrote the following to our community:

'Tomorrow, celebrated as our national Sorry Day, brings a day of national significance and an apology of more than symbolic gesturing. I believe that we have a responsibility to honour our Indigenous Australians, and to offer them the respect we Christians believe is owed to all men and women.

'Pope John Paul II's 2001 address to the Catholic Bishops of Australia was very strong on the point of recognising the past and moving forward together:

"The Church will support the cause of all indigenous peoples who seek a just and equitable recognition of their identity and their rights... Whenever the truth has been suppressed by governments and their agencies or even by Christian communities, the wrongs done to the indigenous peoples need to be honestly acknowledged... The past cannot be undone, but honest recognition of past injustices can lead to measures and attitudes which will help to rectify the damaging effects for both the indigenous community and the wider society. The Church expresses deep regret and asks forgiveness where her children have been or still are party to these wrongs. Aware of the shameful injustices done to indigenous peoples in Oceania, the Synod Fathers (Australian Church) apologised unreservedly for the part played in these by members of the Church, especially where children were forcibly separated from their families... Governments are encouraged to pursue with still greater energy programmes to improve the conditions and the standard of living of indigenous groups in the vital areas of health, education, employment and housing."

'As a College community we have welcomed indigenous boys and young men. We have committed to this path. We seriously need to make them welcome as we would welcome all members of our diverse but rich community.

'Pope John Paul II said to Australia's Indigenous in Alice Springs in 1986: "You are part of Australia and Australia is part of you. And the Church herself in Australia will not be fully the Church that Jesus wants her to be until you have made your contribution to her life and until that contribution has been joyfully received by others."

In response to the Prime Minister's apology on behalf of the nation, I wrote to or local Federal Member, Ms Catherine King to voice my appreciation of the speech:

'Dear Catherine

Thank you, Kevin Rudd and the parliament for such a moving day. I was driving to Melbourne for a 10.00am meeting and so was able to hear the Prime Minister in full, as well as the supporting speech of Dr Nelson. I hope that you are proud to have been our elected representative on such an energising and humbling day. We focussed on this Sorry Day at our Assembly yesterday as part of our commitment to the Indigenous Youth

Leadership Programme as well as our basic Christian tenet of respect for each individual created in the image of God. Welcoming the stranger is a sign of an Edmund Rice school!

I pray that we as a nation can now move forward. Our recent visits to Darwin, the Tiwi Islands and Timber Creek have energised our staff and students to work for a just solution in a land where I firmly believe, 'I am, you are, we are Australian'.

On the hottest St Patrick's Day imaginable, 1800 of us gathered in the O'Malley Sports Centre to celebrate Eucharist on our patronal feast and invest our student leaders. The day started with the Blessing of the Br R.M.Miller Wing by George Cardinal Pell, Archbishop of Sydney, in the company of Bishop Peter Connors, Bishop of Ballarat and Patron of the College.

EDMUND RICE EDUCATION AUSTRALIA (EREA)

As most will be aware a new governance structure has been put in place to manage Christian Brothers schools across Australia. EREA came into being on October 1, 2007, with its existence being formally recognised and celebrated by schools at a series of national and regional events in February 2008. The following speech was made by the Executive Director of EREA, Dr Wayne Tinsey and expresses succinctly the aspirations held for the entity charged with the responsibility of ensuring that schools remain faithful to the teachings of Jesus of the Gospel and the charism of founder Blessed Edmund Rice.

Friends of Edmund Rice Education

Dr Wayne Tinsey

I begin by acknowledging the living culture of the traditional custodians of the land we stand on today and pay tribute to the unique role they play in the life of this region. I do this at a very significant time in the history of our nation. The Federal Government has formally apologised to the Indigenous people of this land and recognised the displacement of a generation of Aboriginal people and the hardship that resulted. Reconciliation, justice and right relationships are values at the heart of Edmund Rice Education.

As someone who has received most of my education from the Christian Brothers, I am very proud to be standing here today on this momentous occasion. Today we should acknowledge that we stand on the 'shoulders of giants'! On this day when we formally launch Edmund Rice Education Australia, we should acknowledge the dedication and commitment of the Christian Brothers, the vowed custodians of the charism of Edmund Rice. We acknowledge their contribution to Catholic education in this land and the great gift they are to the Australian Church. Edmund Rice would surely be pleased at the bravery and trust you have shown in the future by establishing Edmund Rice Education Australia, a new expression of this charism. We are indeed privileged to have many Christian Brothers here with us today. On behalf of past, present and future generations of young Australians, I thank you Brothers.

I also acknowledge and thank the leaders of our Australian Church, some of whom are with us today. Edmund Rice Education is a work of and for our Church; a generous and inclusive Church that shows deep love for the poor and marginalised; a Church which strives to usher in the Kingdom of God- the promise of fullness of life and true freedom for all in our troubled world. The Charter for Edmund Rice Education and the foundations upon which we stand clearly direct us to the 'margins', to the disadvantaged, to those who lack hope. The Church we serve promotes service and compassionate engagement with the world as indispensible to the way Christians worship a loving and expansive God.

Edmund Rice schools are called to be places of evangelisation, places where the priorities of the Christian Gospel are brought to bear on every facet of life. They are places where individuals form relationships with Christ, and hearts and minds are forever changed. The Jesus we proclaim described his mission as bringing life in its fullness to the whole of humankind. Our schools need to be places where students and teachers - all of the community - can experience Christ and the power of that presence to make deep meaning of life. Yeats once said that: "Education is not filling a bucket but lighting a fire!" Surely this fire should translate into a passion for life, meaning

and purpose!


The Gospel must also come to bear on our school culture and structures. Edmund Rice schools must be places where who we are and what we try to do is permeable to the priorities of the Christian gospel. Our policies, our relationships, our inclusivity, what we see as being important, what we celebrate, who we serve, what we challenge, all need to be guided by the priorities of the Gospel. We must challenge versions of the world which define success solely in terms of money, accumulation of things and over-emphasis on status and security. Our aim is to equip young people to critique our consumer culture and its version of the good, the well-lived, the important and the meaningful life. How well we do these things should become our guide to authenticity, our measure of success.

It is a reality that many of our schools have become comfortable and attractive to those who may primarily seek our 'fruits but not our roots'. Edmund Rice Education must resist in a society that increasingly sees education as a commodity which can be bought. We must resist the temptation to have our schools being used principally as vehicles for sociodifferentiation and creeping elitism. At times even the parents of our students need to be reminded that we are on about more than strong academic results, 'good discipline' and providing a 'caring environment', as important as these qualities are for any school community.

To set our priorities and define our success solely by league tables and sporting achievements betrays the foundations upon which we stand. Edmund Rice Education in this land can model a family of schools where those who can look after those who can't; where co-responsibility becomes the norm; where the strong accept responsibility for those on the margins.

Regrettably, some voices in the Church say that Catholic education has past its 'golden era', and that Catholic schools increasingly lack relevance in the Church's mission. There may be some validity in these claims if Catholic schools are being driven by agendas that cannot be linked to the Gospel, by economic rationalist thinking and by the 'Gods of the HSC, TEE and VCE'. If the thing that we can boast most proudly about to the world is our ability to get good tertiary entrance rankings out of the students, then perhaps our schools should be closed or at least re-named to more honestly reflect our paramount aims and aspirations. This is not an attack on the pursuit of academic excellence, but rather it is a call for honesty and authenticity. Let us always be guided by the words of Archbishop Oscar Romero of El Salvador, who, shortly before he was killed, reminded his people: 'Judge not your success by your numbers or the quality of your buildings... judge your success by the quality of your hearts and your efforts to live the call of the Gospel.'

As great as the past may have been, we have an obligation to forge an even better future. Over reliance on 'tradition' can see the perpetuation old patterns of the past without questioning their relevance. This is 'traditionalism' and it stifles the prophetic. Br Philip Pinto, Congregation Leader of the Christian Brothers, when addressing Brothers in Brisbane last week said: 'We need a new story. The old is exhausted and exhausting'. The Brothers have entrusted a significant part of their story to Edmund Rice Education Australia. We must do our part in the creation of the 'new story'.

Edmund Rice Education Australia has responsibility for the schooling of 40,000 young Australians; I am told that 20% or

one in five of boys in Catholic secondary schools in our nation attend an Edmund Rice school. What an awesome responsibility! But at the same time, what a magnificent opportunity to make sure that that the priorities of the Gospel which so heavily motivated Edmund Rice, contribute to the religious and educational fabric of our nation. This opportunity must not be lost!

I thank all who have had anything to do with the preparation of these launches. They are a true celebration of our past and our future. We vow to do our very best to be faithful to our mission and may the charism of Edmund Rice, inspired by the Gospel, take on a new expression on a national scale so that we can be bearers of hope for our Church and our society.

2008 **ACADEMIC ASSEMBLY**

The Academic Assembly in February is the first time for the year where all students gather as a College community. The Assembly recognises and celebrates the achievements of students from the Class of 2007 and reinforces to all students the College's primary focus upon teaching and learning outcomes for students and the pursuit of personal excellence. All students who achieved an ENTER score over 90 were formally recognised at the Assembly, as were duces in each VCE subject who obtained a study score in excess of 40.

Congratulations to 2007 Dux David Ranger who achieved an ENTER score of 99.7. This was the leading score for a boy in the Ballarat region and was recognised, along with his other curricular and cocurricular endeavours, with him being awarded Ballarat's leading student by the Australian College of Educators. This follows on from David's honour of being recognised with a Premier's Award for Physical Education in 2006, being the Dux of the College in 2007 and Dux of all five of his Year 12 subjects.

This year he will study Science and Engineering at Monash University. David's academic achievements are only one side of his incredible contribution to the College. David was active within social justice, opened the batting in the 1st XI Premiership team and was a highly decorated member of College athletics and cross country teams.

David made an incredible contribution to Edmund Rice Day over six years being the leading fundraiser for the annual walkathon each year during his time at the College. These funds are disbursed to Edmund Rice associated charities, nationally and overseas. David's father Terry noted in discussions with staff that David is a shy boy and got extremely nervous when asking people for donations. This makes the following history of fundraising for Edmund Rice Day even more meritorious:

The Introduction of Academic Awards and Certificates

The 2008 Academic Assembly acknowledged and celebrated the academic success of those Year 12 and 11 students who excelled in VCE Units 3 and 4 studies in 2007. The assembly served as a timely reminder to all students that a sustained effort in the pursuit of excellence has its rewards. To ensure that the excellence and endeavour displayed by so many of the students is acknowledged and recognised in a timely and regular way, the College has this year introduced several academic awards and certificates.

The first of these is the Headmaster's Excellence Award to acknowledge work of an exceptionally high standard. Teachers will nominate student work (which could be written work, a performance or an item that the student has produced) and the College Dean will meet with the nominated student to discuss his work. If the work meets the criteria for excellence, then the student will be presented with the Headmaster's Excellence Award at a College Assembly.

The second of the new awards is an Academic Endeavour Award. This award will acknowledge students who have completed a piece of work to the very best of their ability regardless of how this work compares with other students' work. Students will be nominated by their subject teacher and each nominated student and his item of work will be verified by the respective Head of School and then recommended to the College Dean for the Award. This award will be presented at either a College or School Assembly.

The third of the awards to be introduced in 2008 will be an end of semester award which will be known as The Chris Nolan Award. Chris graduated from St Patrick's in 1985 and was the College Captain that year. He then completed his Law Degree at Monash University and went on to practice law in Vietnam. Chris was highly respected by all for his commitment and enthusiasm to all aspects of College life and demonstrated his intelligence and ingenuity shortly after leaving St Patrick's as one of the cofounders of the highly acclaimed Meredith Music Festival. After several years in Vietnam, Chris tragically acquired severe brain injuries from a viral infection leading to total organ failure.

Although Chris is now profoundly disabled physically, he has continued to fight against his disability. Chris is the face of people promoting awareness and fighting for the provision of specific nursing homes for young people with acquired brain injuries – currently people such as Chris are housed in elderly nursing facilities.

As a student at the College Chris exemplified the pursuit of excellence, regularly achieving strong academic results and in his final year he was awarded:

- the Headmaster's Award for Leadership;
- the History Prize;
- the Sir Hugh Devine Prize for Impromptu Speech;
- the W.T. Doyle Prize for Debating; and
- the 1st XI Cricket Bowling Award.

The Chris Nolan Award will be presented to the top 15% of students in each year level at the end of each semester. Each student's performance on the assessment tasks reported on at the end of each semester will be tallied and the top 15% from each year level will receive the Award. Calculating this has been simplified as the result of a change to assessment procedures that will see all work submitted for assessment being marked as percentage. Semester One certificates will be presented at the beginning of Term Three and certificates for Semester Two results will be presented at the beginning of the following year.

Students who receive this award for both semesters will also be presented with a College Academic Excellence Certificate to acknowledge their consistency in their academic pursuits.

A NEW PROCESSIONAL BOOK



AN AFRICAN **IMMERSION**

During the Easter break, two St Patrick's College teachers, Mrs Helen McLennan and Mrs Sara Taylor participated in an Immersion programme at the Brother Beausang Catholic Education Centre in Embulbul, Kenya. The school of 740 students is set in a slum area on the outskirts of Nairobi, the capital in which some of the violence, in response to the December elections, took place in January this year.

The primary school has no electricity or running water and the secondary school has no library or computer labs. It was a wonderful opportunity for us to interact with the teaching and support staff and the students of both the primary and secondary schools. We exchanged ideas about teaching and learning and were able to contribute to the future planning of the school. We worked with teachers in the classrooms and discussed topics such as special education, literacy, the development of research skills, teaching strategies, and types of learners and how to develop effective classroom strategies.

Helen was particularly involved with the new Bridging Class (a group who required an extra year to prepare them for secondary school). The willingness of the teachers to engage in professional dialogue was humbling. We too learned so much about the challenges of making education accessible and engaging without access to so much that we in Australia take for granted books, libraries, computers, internet access, audio-visual resources, well equipped science laboratories, the list goes on.

We were also overwhelmed by the children's willingness to be taught by mzungus (foreigners) who spoke with very strange accents. It is interesting to note that all the children spoke at least three languages - their tribal language, Kiswahili and English in which they were taught. The children's affection and genuine warmth towards us were so touching. While the structure of the classrooms, the size of classes, the buildings and the curriculum were

necessarily very different to those in Australia, the common thread was the belief that education can transform, that it is the only way that these children will find a future in a modern and rapidly changing Kenya.

The recent political events and the fallout have only served to increase the desire to see the education of Kenya's young as a priority. Perhaps one of the most salutary experiences for us was the home visits to a variety of communities around the school. The reality that many students walk up to ten or more kilometres to school each day often in the dark, was as eye opening as the conditions in which some lived. Despite often rising at 4 am to study before school, arriving at school at 7 am to do more homework and often not arriving home until after 6 pm at night the thirst for education was undiminished.

The parents we met were adamant that their children finish secondary school despite finding the minimal fees, by our standards, often impossible to pay. We really appreciate now how important the sponsorship programme is and many families rely upon it. It was also a privilege for me to be part of the discussions about the new school buildings and the library in particular. The Principal, Br Laurie Collin's determination to ensure that the students have access to current educational resources and facilities is inspiring.

It is easy to list the challenges that lay ahead for the school, for example the primary school has no play equipment, the school relies on volunteers, and there are often 40 children in a class, but there was an overwhelming sense that the staff, both Brothers and lay teachers, will not be diminished by the challenges they collectively face and that with professional and financial support the sky is the limit for the students and the school.

One of the St Patrick's College initiatives already set in place to support the school is the collection of unwanted story books from our boys which can then be shipped over to create a primary school library. The \$2000 that ours boys raised with the casual clothes day last term was very gratefully received and will also go towards the new library. It was a salutary and wonderful experience.



JAPANESE STUDENTS VISIT

In early March, 25 students from Shibuya Junior High School visited the College for a 12 day family host stay experience. Our visitors from Japan greatly enjoyed their time within the College community. The boys enjoyed a diverse range of experiences whilst in Ballarat, ranging from a footy clinic with the North Ballarat Roosters, a visit to Sovereign Hill and Kireet Burrit Aboriginal Gallery and the opportunity to attend classes with their host student. This is the sixth group from Shibuya that have visited the College.

The boys loved any opportunity to get outside and play games, regularly showing off their immense talents in soccer and baseball. The continued fine weather over the stay enabled many families to head to the coast with visiting boys greatly enjoying surfing and swimming experiences. One of our Japanese students sent staff into a mild panic when he decided to navigate his own way back to Waubra after his first day of school. He managed a couple of bus changes to arrive dutifully at home much to the surprise of his host family who had arranged to collect him after sports practice. The Shibuya students are used to the Tokyo subway, so a bus trip through the rolling plains to Waubra is barely a challenge!

Thank you very much to our host families who have opened their hearts and homes to our visitors. The time spent with families is the highlight for all of our visitors. Partaking in simple activities such as shopping, visiting friends or a trip to a farm are captivating experiences for our visitors. Thank you also to ESL teachers Mrs Sue Anne Garcian and Mrs Jacinta Waddington who organised a many additional experiences for the boys, including an informative session with Year 12 student Calvin Anzac who spoke to the boys about Indigenous culture and his experiences of life at Timber Creek in the Northern Territory. The Japanese students were spellbound by his talk and could not fully comprehend his strong connection to the land and the isolation of his community.

Many wonderful friendships have been formed and the horizons of our students greatly expanded from spending time with boys from another culture.

LIONS YOUTH OF THE YEAR

Lions Youth of the Year is a quest run by the Lions Club International. Its main aim is to find and recognise students who have taken part and excelled in various areas of school and community life. Participants are assessed in two ways: eighty percent of their final score is derived from an interview, with the remaining twenty percent from two gruelling impromptu speeches and a prepared speech. Local clubs in the Ballarat region held the first round over two weeks.

Liam O'Riley, Jack Ferguson, Thomas McKinnon and Stephen Kirby chose to represent both themselves and the College. All four students competed in a fine manner, doing themselves and the College very proud.

Jack Ferguson, who spoke on Poverty, and Liam O'Riley, on Chile 1973 were awarded the public speaking award.

Thomas McKinnon spoke on whether the sporting world has gone soft, and received a high commendation, being awarded runner-up for his efforts. Stephen Kirby spoke on a topic close to his heart, that being the inequality of pay for teachers. He was successful in all aspects, gaining the overall award and will now move onto the next round of the competition.

INDIGENOUS EDUCATION AT ST PATRICK'S

As featured in recent editions of *The Shamrock*, the College is committed to providing educational opportunities for Indigenous students to redress some of the highly publicised inequities in access and outcomes for students and to assist students who are referred to the College and deemed to be 'at risk' if they remain in their current community. The College is auspiced as an Indigenous Youth Leadership Programme

(IYLP) provider and currently has thirteen Indigenous students enrolled at the College. Seven boys live within the boarding school, four coming from Timber Creek in the Northern Territory, with one each from the communities of Framlingham, Bathurst Island and Shepparton.

In February The Courier featured an article on IYLP scholar Calvin Anzac and his response to Prime Minister Rudd's apology to the 'Stolen Generation'. A few days later Calvin received a letter from legendary St Patrick's College teacher Peter Farley detailing the College's long history of support for Indigenous affairs, in particular the establishment of the 'Aboriginal Advancement Group' in 1967. The Group was an initiative of five students, supported by Br G. V. Frances. The boys from the Leaving Class of 1967/68 were Frank Tierney, Leo Borelli, John Cleary, Pat Short and Robert Allan. Peter pays tribute to the courage and perseverance of the boys who were able to raise funds for scholarships for Indigenous students. They also had the good fortune to meet the legendary Pastor Sir Doug Nicholls, a Governor of South Australia and VFL footballer with Fitzrov.

Peter noted that whilst the boys received great encouragement from the College, and in particular Br Frances, this was not always the case in their home towns and business communities. The achievement of being able to raise enough funds for a full boarding scholarship to support Daryl Cronin (SPC 1970-72) from Adelaide River was an inspiring achievement of the group.

The aim of the group was to ultimately sponsor an aboriginal boy to attend St Patrick's College and in so doing 'assist the aborigines in their own endeavours to improve their position'. It is perhaps an indictment on many of the well intentioned programmes staged by many agencies and by all governments that this is a topic that will be debated with great vigour at the upcoming '2020 Summit'. The closing remark from Group Secretary John Cleary in the 1968 Annual SPC AAG article, provides a poignant and chilling prediction about the challenges, failures and direction of Indigenous education initiatives post 1967, 'the task of Aboriginal Advancement is difficult, but rewarding'. As we strive for equity in access to educational opportunities in 2008 and beyond the College can take great inspiration and encouragement from the work of members of this group, who supported by staff, recognised that such endeavours, difficult as they may be, were consistent with the ethos and example of Blessed Edmund Rice.


2007 KOKODA TRIP

Follow Up


In 2007 staff member Mr Michael Weadon led a party of students, staff, old boys and parents on a trek along the renowned Kokoda Trail. One of the places they visited was the village of Saga. Whilst there they conducted AFL and cricket clinics with local children and were blessed by clergy before embarking upon the next stage of their journey. The group donated funds to the village and have subsequently had a guest house named in recognition of the College – the 'St Patrick's College Guest House'.

In all the SPC Kokoda expedition stayed for two nights in this village and have donated money raised in Australia towards the education of the local children. The group were touched by the generosity and spontaneity of the welcome afforded to the party and the hosts' hospitality. We also realised quickly the disparity in wealth between ourselves and our hosts. We had more in our backpacks than whole families owned and we only had to rough it for two weeks, was the feeling of all in the party.

2008 College Vice Captain Jack Ferguson has been diligently raising funds to send to the village to help them recover from Cyclone Guba. Cyclone Guba devastated the province late in 2007. The village Priest's cousin was drowned and some houses were washed away. Most importantly the village's main food source, the numerous vegetable gardens were washed away. Currently the community is existing on they donated food flown into the nearby Kokoda airstrip. During the March holiday break a group of 80 students, staff and parents visited Darwin and the top end as part of the College's 1st XVIII football programme. The trip was organised by Director of Football Mr Howard Clark and provided students with a range of football development opportunities as well as a diverse range of educational experiences.

Highlights of the tour from a football perspective were games against the Northern Territory Under 18 Northern Squad played at the TIO Stadium (the ground used for AFL matches), a game against a Tiwi Island representative team and an inspiring address from AFL Legend Michael Long.

The boys were able to take in a range of educational experiences including visits to Kakadu National Park, Litchfield National Park, Katherine Gorge, East Point Military Museum, Adelaide River crocodile spectacular as well as conducting school football clinics at Malac Primary School. The boys attended Mass on Easter Sunday with a number of boys meeting East Timor President Jose Ramos - Horta who is recuperating in Darwin after a recent assassination attempt.

In game one of the tour, the SPC 1st XVIII were outplayed by a highly talented NT squad which featured relatives of AFL names such as Michael Long, Shannon Motlop (Steven Motlop kicked 5 goals), Maurice Rioli and Xavier Clarke. Playing with a squad of 40 in hot and humid conditions St Pat's made a strong start but were outplayed as their rivals from the top end started to improve their team work and the boys from Ballarat tired in the oppressive conditions. It is the off season for the NT boys and they greatly appreciated a game in preparation for the upcoming Under 18 Championships. Final scores were NT 14.17. 101 to SPC 4.4.28.


On Saturday March 29 SPC 1st XVIII played a Tiwi Island representative squad. The Tiwi Islands are the home of current AFL star Cyril Rioli. The trip was an eye opening experience for the boys with a large crowd of passionate islanders turning out to see the game. As the ball was bounced a fierce storm hit the ground with the game being played in torrential rain and howling winds. After four quarters the game was declared a tie with some exceptional skills on show despite the conditions.

The day before the game the squad met with AFL Legend and Indigenous spokesman Michael Long who delivered a salient and inspiring message to the group; 'make your mark, learn to shut your mouth, listen and learn. See education as a life long process and make the most of opportunities that are presented to you. Be proud, have a plan and set goals in line with your plan. Hard work is the secret to success'. These messages were particularly relevant to the boys as they spent time with indigenous students in schools and community.

The trip was a memorable educational and sporting experience for boys, thanks primarily to the vision and leadership of Director of Football Mr Howard Clark supported by Director of Sport Mr Chris Gleeson, Mr Peter Brady and Board Member Mrs Leonie Spencer who ensured all travel arrangements went like clock work. The trip is part of a three year experiential programme which incorporates a trip to Ireland and the UK, a tour of Darwin and an intensive AFL clubs' experience over a three year cycle. The Melbourne experience will be held for the first time in 2009.





The First XI completed back to back premierships with a resounding 55 run victory over Grammar on our Main Oval. This was an outstanding effort given that our Captain Brad Whittaker was injured prior to the match and was unable to play, and our highest wicket taker for the season, Vice-Captain, Brad Hallam

withdrew from the team on the eve of the match. This left Peter Colbourne with the task of leading the team for the first time this year in the Grand Final.

Peter did everything right from the beginning, winning the toss and batting. Unfortunately we were in immediate trouble losing Daniel Nicholson, caught on the first ball of the match and Ben Nankervis (our run machine over the previous two matches) dismissed for four. At 2/6 Grammar were off to a flying start and must have been happy to have our highest run scorer for the season, Mathew Begbie in so early to face the challenge of the new ball. Matthew combined with Peter Colbourne to begin to change the momentum of the match with a small, but time consuming partnership of twenty runs. Peter made 10 before nicking one behind.

Robert Ryan then joined Begbie and the two then started to turn the match our way before Robert cut a ball straight to point for 9 with the score on 52. At 4/52 things again started to look grim and once again the Grammar bowlers must have been confident with a fresh batsmen at the wicket.

Tom Frawley batted magnificently and ran quickly between the wickets to compile a composed 56 not out. We were bowled out in the second last over for 164.

The tally certainly gave our bowlers plenty of heart as the wicket was keeping low as the day went on. Josh Brown and Nick O'Brien opened the bowling and Josh was bowling with the wind at his back and with plenty of pace. Josh and Nick ripped through Grammar's top order, including the prize scalp of Ross Cresswell for 2. At 5/18 the match looked over. However Tate and Morcom 'dug in' for a partnership of 25 and then Tate and Batch combined for a 28 run partnership. At tea Grammar were back in the match at 6/65 with Tate batting beautifully.



- Damien Farrell and Sean Mundy have been selected in the Victorian Under 18 Rugby Union squad to contest the National Titles in 2008.


ST PATRICK'S COLLEGE ART EXHIBITION September 12-14, 2008

night also provides an opportunity to recognise the achievements of some others who have forged outstanding careers whilst staying largely out of the public spotlight.

Graham was simply inspiring and moved all his attendance with the story of his rise from running his father's panel beating business to holding prominent positions in the business and sporting worlds. As Chair of Racing Victoria in particular he has headed an organisation that has transformed the Melbourne Cup into one of the leading events on the world's racing calendar.

Kevin Renwick was equally inspirational in outlining his journey from local builder to CEO of nationally renowned building giant, Hotondo Homes. His commitment to quality, the development of people and community was inspiring and explains the regard with which he is held within the building industry and in his home town of Deniliquin.

Chris O'Brien captivated attendees with his 'rags to riches' story. From humble beginnings as a school rowing coach he has risen to the level of a national coach, along the way coaching some of the nation's finest rowers at international level. He will again be heavily involved in preparing crews for racing at this year's World Championships and the Beijing Olympic Games. The secret to his success was evident to all on the night enthusiasm, perseverance and outstanding interpersonal and communication skills. His hallmark at St Patrick's was his commitment to rowing and his care and understanding for boys in the rowing programme - these traits have stood him in good stead to achieve excellence in coaching at the highest level.

ST PATRICK'S DAY 1920-60S REUNION LUNCHEON

Legend has it that large crowds would gather at the Main Oval for Sunday fixtures to see Jim display his aerial and goal kicking talents. Jim later went on to enjoy an outstanding career as a surgeon and at the tender age of 94 still maintains good health. He wrote to the College

following the luncheon to express his appreciation and noted, 'that he and Moira were taken by the courtesy and kindness of the prefects who greeted us and showed us around on the day and the general happy atmosphere of the school'.

NOB-SPC AMATEUR FOOTBALL CLUB NEWS



OLD BOYS IN THE NEWS

- Blair Brown (SPC 2000-2004), a member of the victorious 2004 Head of the Lake crew has been selected to represent Australia in the Men's Eight at the 2008 World Rowing Championships. Blair is an AIS scholarship holder and will be hoping that a strong performance can secure him a seat for the Beijing Olympic Games in August.
- Jidah Clark (SPC 2004-2005) was featured in the February edition of the Law Institute Journal. Jidah has been employed by Law Institute Victoria President Tony Burke as a summer clerk. Mr Burke's decision to appoint Jidah was in part due to Jidah's excellent application to study, but also in part to the professions growing recognition that it had largely failed Indigenous lawyers. Jidah is determined to make an impact in the law, in particular to represent other Indigenous people and to encourage Indigenous secondary students to study law.
- Eamon Coughlan (SPC 2002-2007) has been awarded an Excellence and Equity Scholarship to Monash for the duration of his studies in recognition of his academic performance in 2007 and his resilience in achieving academic excellence despite enduring considerable hardship due to ill health within his family during his VCE years. Well done Eamon!

• The St Patrick's College community was deeply saddened to learn of the passing on April 8 of one of its most famous and celebrated sons, Archbishop Sir Frank Little (SPC 1938-42). Headmaster Dr Peter Casey, Deputy Headmaster Mr Steven O'Connor and six members of the Student Council attended the funeral service and were warmly greeted by many old boys, including His Eminence George Cardinal Pell who spent ten minutes after the service talking to the College's student leaders. Archbishop Sir Frank Little attended St Patrick's from 1938 to 1942 and characterised so much of what it is to be a St Patrick's boy - a gifted scholar and athlete, a man of great faith and compassion, who possessed a wonderful

sense of humour and was an integral part of the Melbourne community he served. This was evident in his status for many years as the number one ticket holder of his beloved Essendon Football Club. Sir Frank was a regular visitor to the College and upon the occasion of the opening of the Little Wing named in his honour in 2004, detailed the incredible influence of the College on his four uncles and his father and their subsequent professional lives, starting with the winning of two Military Crosses in the first World War and extending to the two QC's, a surgeon and a VFL player! The Little Family Award is one of two premier student awards and is given for contribution to school spirit, a hallmark of the Little Family at St Patrick's College since 1904 when the first of the Archbishop's family commenced studies in Ballarat. Archbishop Little was a gifted scholar and sportsman universally admired by his peers. He was Captain and Dux of the College in 1942 before entering the seminary. He was popular at school and maintained contact with his peers from SPC up to the time of his passing being a regular at the 'Harp of Erin' monthly lunches organised by old boys from the 1930s and 1940s. His Grace, Sir Frank, obtained a Doctorate in Sacred Theology at the Urban University in Rome and has

served as priest, bishop and archbishop in the Archdiocese of Melbourne. His loves include regular meetings with his St Patrick's Old Collegian friends and supporting the Essendon Football Club of which he was the Number One Ticket Holder for many years, supplanted by the Treasurer Mr Peter Costello. He was recognised as a man of great compassion, a humble, engaging man who went out of his way to talk to people, whatever their circumstance. He will be greatly missed. During his life the Archbishop managed to balance academic success. sporting prowess, spiritual fervour and leadership while maintaining a sense of humour and good relationships with people. Throughout his life he has reflected on life's offerings and said yes to opportunity. Archbishop Sir Frank Little is an exemplar of St Patrick's College's pillars of faith, tradition, excellence and joy and the College community deeply mourns his passing, whilst also celebrating the extraordinary contribution he made to the culture of the College and its rich history. The following tribute was written by the College's Director of Mission Mr Joe Doolan who enjoyed a long association with the Archbishop.

Football and Frank Little.

In the early nineteen sixties at the Essendon football ground the opening game saw Geoff Leek, the local ruckman, going for the knockout at the opening bounce. He was infringed upon and ten seconds into the match was awarded a free kick. Fr Noel Coghlan, a strident Bomber supporter with a stentorian voice, bellowed from the member standing area, 'And about time too'! Not given to such demonstrative outburst, Father and later Archbishop Thomas Francis Little would often stand in the outer under cover in the W.R Crichton Stand. One Saturday morning in 1974 this old boy of the College received the phone call to inform him that he was to become the sixth leader of the Archdiocese of Melbourne. He knelt down, prayed and that afternoon strolled up to Windy Hill, probably relishing this last vestige of relative anonymity The announcement of his accession was not publicised until the following Monday.

Of the many qualities we may list for T. F. Little one of the most universally recognised was his joy. In Frank Little we saw a person who exuded God's delight in human kind. Any parish gathering saw him modelling for all a warmth and

genuine interest in all God's people. He would do the rounds of every table at a debutant ball, chatting to all. If the topic was the football, all the better, but if the question was serious his countenance would change and he would address the concerns. With the newly baptized adults celebrating their entry into the Catholic Church he would be the last to leave the Cathedral, offering all his encouragement and support.

Many obituaries will cite his many achievements: College Captain, College Dux, Knighthood, Vatican Career and the gentle shepherding one of the largest Archdioceses in the world. The achievement is remarkable for a shy young seminarian who learned magic as a means of developing some confidence and improvement of his rhetorical skills. Not seen in the College athletic or football photos in 1952 but agile enough to ride a bike to Sydney during the war to attend the Final Vows ceremony of some Christian Brothers. Though a brilliant scholar he did not become a world renowned theologian, scripture scholar or philosopher, for we know the eclectic nature of Archdiocesan management spreads one's knowledge field wide.

Archbishop Thomas Francis Little seemed to live out the old spiritual adage: If we let the Word of God, the Seed of God, take root in our lives and allow it to grow in our freedom, we can become the love of God. Our harvest would be his Glory and our joy. He was a person of great joy. We at St Patrick's are proud of the things God achieved through him. He was one of our best!

- Carroll Rev Fr Jack Carroll (SPC 1934-36), passed away at St Joseph's Home, Little Sisters of the Poor, Northcote on February 20, 2008.
- Brian Darrigan, husband of Melchorita and father of Norton Darrigan (Year 8 2008), died tragically in a work place accident.
- Father Meredith Delahenty (SPC 1928-32), an Old Collegian and priest of the Diocese passed away on April 1. His funeral Mass was celebrated at the St Patrick's Cathedral on Monday April 7 by the Bishop of Ballarat and many of his peers from around the State. Fr Delahenty was ordained a Priest in 1940 and was parish priest at Apollo Bay, Cressy, Penshurst and Creswick.

- Goss Terry (Terence), (SPC 1950-54) passed away in February 2008.
- The College community was deeply saddened to learn of the passing of Stephen Haintz (SPC 1973-78), a former staff member of SPC, son of an old boy Chris Haintz, father of SPC's Christopher and Patrick (Year 10 2008) and Sebastian (Year 6 at St Francis Xavier PS), husband of Kate Lawry (teacher at St Francis Xavier PS). Stephen was a gifted and committed educator and had spent time as Principal of St Thomas More Primary School and at Catholic primary schools in Maryborough and Daylesford. He also taught at St Francis Xavier Primary School and Ballarat Grammar School. Stephen was a highly talented athlete and was a fitness fanatic. He umpired several Ballarat Football League Grand Finals and was respected by all players for his skills and decision making prowess. He was also a talented musician and a great host and was universally respected and admired by people from all sections of the Ballarat community. The funeral which had St Patrick's Cathedral overflowing was a testament to the regard in which Stephen and his family are held in the community.
- Alison Kane, mother of Alistair (Year 8 2008) lost her battle with cancer after an inspirational battle over the past decade. Alistair is now in the legal guardianship of Selwyn Cooper and Elisabeth Cooper-Holmes in line with Alison's wishes. Elisabeth is the mother of Johnno Holmes (Year 11 2008) and James (SPC 1999-2004).
- Leo Rabl (SPC 1933-35) passed away on August 10, 2007. Leo lived in Murtoa and led a wonderful, faith filled life and according to wife Mary won several academic awards in 1934 and 1935.
- Mrs Maree Rantall, wife of Rod, mother
 of Matthew (SPC 2001-06) and Bridie
 (SPC staff 2008) died on March 9 after a
 long battle with cancer. Maree worked at
 OHLC School and the funeral was
 attended by many from the Catholic
 education community as well as many of
 Matt's many friends from the College.
- Bryan Ross of Windsor (SPC1949-51) passed away in January 2008. He spoke fondly of his time at St Patrick's. He was living in Nicholson in Gippsland and is survived by his wife Margaret and their seven children.

- Pat Ryan, a former grounds staff member and father of Julian Ryan and uncle of Aileen Loader died in February after a long battle with cancer. His funeral was celebrated at St Peter's in Daylesford where he was a much loved and respectred character within the community.
- Brian Vear (SPC 1952-55) passed away on February 19, 2008 after a courageous battle with illness. Brian attended St Patrick's College from 1952 to 1955 as a boarder from Euroa. Brian was destined in his final year of 1955 to be a participant in two stirring and significant sporting contests. In 1955 St Patrick's College won the Head of the Lake, which is the blue ribbon event of the Ballarat Public Schools' rowing for the first time since 1937. Vincent Colbert (stroke) and Charlie Castle (3) occupied the same places as they did the previous year, as did the Cox, Brian Hickey and Mr S.O. Wilton was once again Coach. The two new crew members were Brian Vear and Tom Scarff, who were tall, strong boys, who fitted in perfectly with the others to form a beautifully balanced combination. In the race itself, St Patrick's moved to the front in effortless fashion about a third of the way through the contest and was never headed as it won easily by three lengths from Ballarat Grammar. Later in 1955, Brian represented the College in 1st XVIII Football, with new coach, Br Justin Kelty who had the task of winning back the BPS Premiership which was lost for the first time in the previous vear against Ballarat College, In the critical game for the 1955 championship, the backline of Murphy, Vear, Crough and McKinnie saved the day on countless occasions when College were running rampant before half time. game they could not penetrate the defence of McKimmie, Vear and Morganti enabling St Patrick's College to regain the coveted BPS Premiership. After graduating from St Patrick's College, Brian represented Australia at the 1960 Rome Olympic Games in the bow seat of the Men's Coxless Four, which was eliminated in the repechage. In doing so, he was the first College Olympian. Four years later, he once again rowed for Australia at the 1964 Tokyo Olympic Games in the bow seat of the men's eight. Brian spent his life giving back to the sport at which he excelled. In the early seventies as St Kevin's College was developing its rowing and did not have its own shed, Brian coached the

Head of the Lake crew in the Associated Public Schools' Rowing. Brian was a stalwart of the Banks Rowing Club and as President in 2006, was awarded Life Membership of Rowing Victoria, for long and sterling service while working for Banks and successfully competing as well. organiser and competitor in the Masters Rowing and was Chairman of the Organising Committee for both the 2004 Australian Masters Rowing Championships at the Sydney International Regatta Centre and the Championships at Nagambie in Victoria. At the memorial service held for Brian on Wednesday February 27, Gill Brewster from the Victorian Olympic Council presented an Olympic flag to Brian's family. A fitting gesture for an esteemed old boy and respected rowing identity.
