

Student Programmes and Teaching & Learning

This is the first year that boys will have vied for Chris Nolan Awards since their entry into Year 7 in 2008. Fittingly, eleven Year 12 boys have achieved a Chris Nolan award in each of their eleven semesters and they were recognised at Assembly recently.

Student Leadership and Pastoral Care

Peter Oakley, Nicholas McMaster and Luke Wilson have ably led the Year 12 Student Council, the Student Congress and the general student body. They have been evident across the arts and sport as well as in academic pursuits. This year's Council members have been particularly noticeable in their promotion of interactions with the ladies of Loreto at many levels. This has been most positive.

The boys continue to flourish through the care showered on them by our staff, both teaching and non-teaching. Having people genuinely interested in one's wellbeing is a very affirming notion to boys as they grapple with adolescent issues of identity, sexuality, personhood, value systems and hopefully faith.

Catholic Identity

To assist in this latter area which is core to our being, our identity as a Catholic school in the Edmund Rice tradition, our Mission Team led by Mr Geoff Brodie has worked assiduously to find new ways of engaging staff in the work of engaging the boys in what must be the work of all. Our liturgies flourish as opportunities for all to enter into our sacred mysteries, into our celebration of all that is good, and into our remembrance of friends in good times and sad.

Cultural Pursuits

A highlight of the year was the production of Sweeney Todd under the aegis of Mr Greg Shawcross, something the boys could sink their teeth into!

Sporting Activities

Highlights for me include the tour of Ireland, London and Paris, the hosting of the state schoolboys rugby grand finals and the fourth consecutive win in the Herald-Sun Shield by the 1st XVIII, as well as the growing number of house-based competitions at lunchtime and after school, complementing our BAS representations.

Boarding

Boarding continues at the heart of the College. We farewell our Director of Boarding, Mr Alex Hunt, because of family circumstances, Alex has brought a good level of rigour to our Boarding processes and the certification of staff.







Student Population

The new year saw us start with 1375 students, up by 50 students from last year. We anticipate an enrolment in 2014 of 1400.

Finances

The College Board and the Finance Committee continue to zealously ensure that our resources are well husbanded, keeping the costs to parents at a sustainable level while providing adequately for the programmes we choose to offer and the growth of our facilities to cater for those who wish to join us.

Support

The College is grateful for the way in which it continues to be well served by its support groups: the Board, the Old Collegians Association, the Foundation, the Friends of St Patrick's, the Friends of Music and the SPC Rowing Club.

During the year, Edmund Rice Education Australia was officially recognised by the Church as the entity responsible for our school as well as the other educational ventures of the Christian Brothers in Australia. I am a member of the old guard of principals who are still struggling to modify the bureaucratic model adopted by EREA. We seek to limit the impost on schools locally, both financially and in the duplication of reporting. Overall EREA appears to be serving the needs of the Congregation of Christian Brothers to be reassured with regard to legal compliance and to charism continuity but other religious orders have much leaner mechanisms to achieve this.

While we have continued to enjoy the support of the Church locally and across the diocese, we have been mindful of the pain being examined and being suffered because of the Parliamentary Inquiry into the Handling of Child Abuse by Religious and Other Institutions, and the concurrent Royal Commission into Institutional Responses to Child Sexual

Abuse. Many members of our Ballarat community still bear the scars, the shame and some, the guilt of what has been.

Special Events

This year was marked by our 120th birthday celebrations and a farewell to the Christian Brothers on St Patrick's Day. The closure of the local brothers' community was an opportunity to mark the great work of so many people over 120 years, something which should not be lost because of the failings of a few.

We have lived with pain and suffering throughout the year with several of our boys lucky to escape death, and staff not so lucky. We remember Mr Phil Sherry who died recently after a long battle with cancer, and pray for Ms Cathy Warhurst who is currently in intensive care suffering from cancer and who has a poor prognosis. We remember the families who have suffered similar losses and pray for the eyes of faith to filter our sadness.



As I conclude I offer my thanks, and those of the broad College community, to all who have added to our flourishing in 2013. With a touch of sadness we farewell our Year 12s and several staff, but we view them as our missionaries, taking our story to the world. In particular, I thank our Deputy Head: Student and Staff Wellbeing, Mr Chris Caldow, who leaves us to take up the principalship of Penola College in Melbourne. Chris has been universally admired for his contribution to our cause, for his capacities to work fairly with all and to value all. We wish him well.

I think that my recent research has finally unearthed the meaning of life in the words, Ecka Dora! I have determined that they mean 'Much joy'.



Traditionally, the College Headmaster presents this award to the College Captain in recognition of his leadership of the College community.





Following is an excerpt from Ben's first address as College Captain-elect which was presented at the Transfer of Leadership Assembly in Term 4:

With privilege comes responsibility and my mantra has always been to commit to doing my

I can honestly say that I have enjoyed every day at the College and have thrived in all aspects of College life. A practical example of this and one that defines us as a school in the Edmund Rice tradition is our commitment to social justice. Through the example of Edmund we are able to enter into relationship with the stories of Jesus of the Gospels and the importance of service. This is borne out each year on Edmund Rice Day where each boy is challenged to raise a minimum of \$40 each for Edmund Rice charities. Now with over 1400 students, this should be an easily attainable task.

However, disappointingly in my time at the College, not once have I seen the goal of \$40,000 reached. The importance and main focus of these days and activities, is to provide hope, support and opportunity to others. We can and do make a difference, but we can do more! So I challenge all in our community to raise the \$40 and make a difference!

As College Captain, I would like to offer this advice to all boys for 2014:

- Enjoy every day in this wonderful place. Your time to depart will quickly come leave a legacy for future generations of St Patrick's boys to aspire to.

I am looking forward to working with the student council and student congress of 2014, to ensure that each body fulfils their duties and contribute to making this great place even better.

In closing I would like to wish the Class of 2013, all the best for their upcoming exams and good luck in whatever they may wish to pursue in future years. 



SPAM history

Year 12 student Christopher Borell has created history by becoming the first student in the College's history to win consecutive St Patrick's Award for Media (SPAM) following his win on November 19.

Chris' film, entitled "Ignited Mind" was hailed by judges for its fantastic balance of captivating sound and dialogue, its compelling storyline and creative and dramatic use of camera angles and visual techniques.

The short film is the culmination of many months of shooting and editing, done mostly in south-west Victoria during bushfire season.

Chris told the audience in his acceptance speech at the SPAM Awards Night that he unintentionally risked his life to get

some of the shots as he found himself surrounded by fire.

It was Chris' second win at the awards function following his victory as a Year 11 student in 2012.

The judging panel, featuring four Old Boys Tom Andrews, Paul King, Ben Andrews and James Seery, said Chris' work had clearly improved in the subsequent 12 months and that the high quality of the 11 finalists in 2013 was a great tribute to the effort and commitment of the students, and also to their teachers Peter Hutchins and Belinda Lees.

Earlier in the evening, the 200 guests at the SPAM presentation night were treated to a glimpse of the College's next generation of film makers as trailers from students in Years 10 and 11 were shown.

from comedy to thriller, and provided enough to suggest students of the next two years will challenge the likes of Chris Borell with their high quality work.

There was much joy for the wider St Patrick's College community in early September when former student James Kerr (SPC 2000-05) was ordained to the priesthood at St Patrick's Cathedral.

In doing so, Fr James became the 316th Old Boy to pursue such a life of faith, and the first since 2002.

The Cathedral was filled with around 550 of Fr James' family, friends, colleagues and well-wishers on Friday, September 6 to witness the ceremony, conducted by Bishop Paul Bird.

Fr James, 26, is the only priest ordained in the Catholic Church in Ballarat this year.

Of more delight to the College, Fr James opted to celebrate his first Mass in the College Chapel on Saturday, September 7 before

allowing the College and the Old Collegians' Association to co-host a luncheon for the entire congregation in the OCA Pavilion.

Fr James had long had an extremely close affiliation with the College, both as a student and as a resident living with his family in McCunnie House for many years while his father, Mick, taught at the College.

Fr James said it was his during his time at St Patrick's that he realised a life in the priesthood may be in his future.

"When I was at pre-school I used to play at doing Mass," he told The Courier.

"But I think I thought more about it in late primary school and early secondary. It was during my time at St Patrick's College I started really thinking seriously about it."

College Headmaster Dr Peter Casey said James was an excellent student, participant and leader in his time at the College.

"In his final year of 2005, he was prominent in academic pursuits (Proxime Accessit with an ENTER of 99.45 and winner of the Dorothy Irene Ellis-Thomas Scholarship), Rugby (Vice-Captain), and St Vincent de Paul Society (Secretary). James was also involved in the senior choir, public speaking and debating," Dr Casey said.

"He then stood as an exemplar to his peers and his juniors. As a College we are proud to welcome him back and congratulate him on his response to his God-given calling.

"We wish him well for the years ahead with Christ beside him, and Christ to lead him."

Researching war history

The College has embarked upon a research project as it seeks to produce a book documenting the history of all its former students who fought in World War I.

College archivist Catriona Banks (above) said the school was aware of nearly 300 Old Boys who had fought in World War I, around 40 of whom were killed in action.

The College will produce a book tracing the lives of as many of these men as possible and will release the book to coincide with the 100th anniversary of the Gallipoli landing in 2015.

"While we have some information on the lives of several former students who fought in the Great War, we need the help of the Ballarat community to provide us with more," Ms Banks said.

"If there are descendants of Old Boys who fought in the war who have information or photos or letters, we'd love to see it so we could look to include them in our publication.

"This book will be a fantastic piece of history for St Patrick's College and for the wider Ballarat community and we are really aiming to make it as comprehensive as possible."

Ms Banks said the College had already unearthed some amazing tales of bravery and heartbreak and was looking forward to producing a compelling historical record of some of Ballarat's bravest men

"We have found two families from the St Patrick's College community at that time who endured the horror of each losing three brothers in the Great War," Ms Banks said.

"We have also found evidence of several Old Boys who were highly decorated for incredible deeds of bravery and honour."

On the Morshead Park synthetic pitch St Patrick's College Blue defeated Ballarat College to claim its sixth BAS title in a row - and eighth if drawn results are counted. This victory was different however because at no stage during the year did we assume that we could win this match and this Championship.

It had been a real struggle to just make the Grand Final because we had lost twice to the College team and were thrashed by the strong Damascus side. Making the final had come down to a percentage calculation that many would have queried.

We defended against the wind to begin and the first five minutes ensured that this game was going to be a tight contest. A defensive error saw us turn the ball over to College for their first incursion and supporters immediately had their hearts in their mouths. However, the backline stayed solid throughout the match and well made up for this error as they continually backed their judgment and passed off down the line and inside to the central players Pat Karras and Jarrah Staley.

The central defence was ably led by Anthony Schuurs and Chris Milroy.

Their contributions were profound as they continually headed the ball clear or ran on the defensive side of their attackers. Tom Whitburn on the left side and Hamish Clydesdale on the right completed this solid defensive line.

Centrally we were doing well as Pat Karras and the frenetic Jarrah Staley seemed to be closing their attacks down before they were raised. Jo Bol also attacked for us with two close shots on goal, the second that demanded a significant save from their keeper.

Looking over last year's final report it was acclaimed that Jack Knight was a key influence in the result and he again produced some outstanding saves and surehanded work in this game. He was again among our best as he was only defeated once by what looked like a set play as College played a ball across the goals to a waiting attacker who made the first score of the match.

We levelled the score after strong attacks on the right side by Pat Karras finding Jo Bol who was able to put shots on goal. Jo teamed with Brody Duggan and his beautiful cross from the right side curved away from the keeper and back

towards the waiting Isaac Harbour who headed surely for our first.

Extra time was called and Jake Selby played his part. He received a pass near the 18-yard box but was challenged by two defenders. He managed to hold his position despite looking like being outmuscled and got the ball square to Isaac Harbour who had made the option centrally. Isaac made no mistake from such an option.

St Patrick's continued to attack and held the lead through the two extra time periods. The boys were rightfully proud of themselves at the presentation of shield and

pennant. This had been a difficult year – the skills shown by all teams was at a high standard. To come through and gain the place in the final was significant, but the win was even more satisfying against a worthy opposition.

120 Years of Greatness

A team of St Patrick's College footballing experts, spanning several decades, has in the past few months had the unenviable task of selecting the greatest team of players ever to pull on the green, white and blue jumper.

The selection panel featured current 1st XVIII coach Howard Clark, former coach Gerard Ryan, Headmaster Dr Peter Casey and a group of esteemed Old Boys including Barry Richardson, John "Jock" Lardner, Graham Duff and Alex McDonald and OCA treasurer Michael Kearney were commissioned to sort through the hundreds of star footballers to emerge from the College, and narrow them down to the best 22 of all time.

The project to name the greatest team of 120 years was launched following an approach by Edmund Rice Education Australia which, in 2014, will announce its best team of all time, sourcing players from all Edmund Rice Schools in Australia. The battle to earn a place in that team will be extremely tough given the quality of footballers who have learnt their trade in Christian Brothers schools over the decades.

To ensure St Patrick's College had the best chance of significant representation in the EREA team, we took the opportunity to reflect on our fine footballing history and identify our best team ever.

Chairman of the selection panel Howard Clark said the task of choosing the team required establishing strict criteria and

then conducting extensive research to ensure the achievements of players from long ago were not overlooked.

"It was always going to be a difficult task given that we have more than 100 Old Boys now that have played football at the highest level," Mr Clark said.

> "Of course, some of the greats of the game have come from St Patrick's and there are a number of players selected in the final team that simply picked themselves. However, there were also many other positions on the ground that were not so clear cut and required the selection panel to engage in spirited debate.

"We are confident though that the final team we have come up with would fare well against any other team from any other school and we are hopeful that several of our stars will be included in the EREA team in 2014."

That St Patrick's College greatest team of 120 years team will be revealed at a red carpet, black tie function on Friday, February 7, 2014 in the Old Collegians' Pavilion at 7pm. Just 250 tickets at \$100 each are available for sale on a first in, first served basis and they are selling fast. "Cardinal George Pell doing his part to help the stairs effort." It would be fair to suggest that when Royal Australian Navy Midshipman Gordon Hutcheon (SPC 2005-10) joined a group attending World Youth Day celebrations this year, he did not expect to be part of a mini, impromptu Old Boy reunion on the other side of the world. We thank him greatly for the following account of a remarkable Peruvian meet-up.

"On June 16 a group of pilgrims left Sydney Airport headed for the World Youth Day celebrations in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil. One 32-hour day later they had landed in Lima, Peru for a week of missionary work in the Pamplona-Alta shanty town. This group was headed by Cardinal George Pell (SPC 1949-59), the Archbishop of Sydney, and the eponym for the Pell Wing. It was 72-strong, full of young people including six from the Australian Defence Force Academy.

Our missionary work was to build 150m of concrete stairs up the steep incline upon which the poor refugees from the Andes have made their homes. These tiny, fibro houses are a mark of the hardships these people faced from the Shining Path terrorist organisation. The hills were covered in loose shale and climbing was difficult. The stairs would make this chore less risky. On completion the local Mayor dubbed the stairs "Escalera Del Cardenal" or the Cardinal's Stairs, in honour of His Eminence.

During our stay, we met some Fathers of the Columban order who had been living a missionary life in Lima for over 30 years. His Eminence introduced them as Old Boys. Fr Chris Baker had attended SPC from 1942 to 1943 and later also taught at the College during which time one of his students was Fr Leo Donnelly (SPC 1940-50). Despite being over 13,000km away from SPC the Old Boy network is still as strong as ever."

Mr Hutcheon also provided the following Q&A session with Cardinal Pell:

Q: Your Eminence, can you provide a quick overview of what you are doing in Lima?

There were 600 Aussie Pilgrims working in the shanty towns of Lima doing different works. Our group was building stairs, there was also a chapel, and some helped renovate the community centres. A group of Maronites built a soccer-field. Obviously this made a bit of a contribution to the local people, but I think the bigger import of it was that it really reminded us of the scale of the poverty in Lima and many parts of South America.

We ran into two missionary priests, Fr Chris Baker and Fr Leo Donnelly. Can you tell me about them? They're Columban priests, that's an Irish missionary order of which quite a few old St Pat's boys are members. Fr Leo was perhaps 10 years older than myself, and he spent his life over in Peru as a missionary working in very poor parishes bringing Christ to the people and helping to produce local vocations who could take over. Fr Donnelly was in charge of this Diocese during the time of the Shining Path guerrillas. There was terrible violence, it was a very stressful time.

Do you feel that missionary work such as this would benefit high school students?

For sure. Quite a number of schools do this in Australia, they go to the Islands, or Papua New Guinea, or East Timor. I mean they don't have to come to South America, but it broadens the student's horizon and they're able to make a real contribution to the local community.

Do you have any closing remarks for the readers of the Shamrock back home?

This is the second time I've been in Peru. The last time I was here I visited the Columban Fathers. There were several Old Boys there at the time. I was pleased, I'm a very loyal Old Boy, and I loved the school when I was there over 50 years ago. It was a consolation to me to meet up on the other side of the world with Old Boys like yourself who are on World Youth Day pilgrimage. I regret there's not a larger number of St Pat's kids that go every World Youth Day. They'd gain a lot from it and thoroughly enjoy it. I'm also pleased to see these priests who've made a wonderful contribution, humanly speaking, spiritually, and religiously in what, by Australian standards, is a very difficult country.

Obituaries

- · One of Ballarat's most influential businessmen Bill Flynn (SPC 1944) died peacefully in October. Bill founded his family-run commercial and industrial building business W.M.Flynn in 1950. He was twice elected to the Shire of Ballarat where he served for 18 years, including two stints as shire president. Bill was married to his wife Mollie for 53 years and had six children and nine grandchildren.
- · Two members of the 1956 1st XVIII - Adrian Bennetto (SPC 1953-56) and Robert 'Dusty' Nelson (SPC 1954-56) - died in August. Adrian spent his working life in education where his skills were recognised as many of the educational professional bodies attested in their remembrances. "Dusty" worked in the television industry from its inception and worked both locally and overseas.
- · Michael Melican (SPC 1944-45) died in August. Michael's death made the Warrnambool Standard as his passing was followed just two days later by that of his wife of 57 years, Loreto. Michael was regarded as a pioneer throughout south-west Victoria for his expertise in herd improvement techniques and was a founding member of the organisation that developed into the Warrnambool Co-op. The couple retired to Warrnambool where they spent their final years looking over their five children and eight grandchildren.
- · Dr Denis Bourke SPC (1949-53) died in September. The first of the mementoes placed on Denis' coffin at his funeral was his old SPC cap. The second memento was his stethoscope, to remind us of his 53 years of generous service as a General Practitioner at his practice in East Bentleigh. Other mementoes recognised his long service to rowing which included being president of the Hawthorn Rowing Club, whose members gave a Salute of Oars.

- · Bill Drake (SPC 1950-53) died on October 3 aged 77. Bill was an outstanding sportsman at St Patrick's, excelling at football and
- · Brien Bourke (SPC 1947-49) died in May aged 79. Brien had a partnership in farming with his brother Hugh and lived on the property at Caldermeade, near Lang Lang. Brien had an interest in horse racing and held an owner-trainer licence for many years. He served as chairman of the Pakenham Racing Club for 20 years.
- · Murray Podbury (SPC 1943-50) died on September 29 in Melbourne. Murray is survived by his wife Dorothy June and his brother Ron (SPC 1942-1947).
- John Basil Hennessy AO (SPC 1937-41) died in October. John was a member of the 1st XVIII in 1941 and always spoke fondly of his time at SPC.
- · Gerald Little (SPC 1937-40) died peacefully at home in October aged 90. Gerald was surrounded by his family at the time of his death and is survived by wife Margaret.
- · Fr Frank Monaghan (SPC 1942-46) died in October in Mildura. Fr Monaghan provided generous ministry in the Ballarat Diocese since his ordination in 1955. We pray for Frank's family, especially his brother John and we remember the parishes of the Sunraysia where Frank ministered for much of his priesthood.


